Officer Information

On 03/19/2024 at 2:00PM I was working as 3E3, working the hours of 2pm to 10pm. I was dressed in full military style police uniform, operating a fully marked squad car N142. I was working in my full capacity as a City of Madison police officer.

Initial Information

On 03/19/2024 at approximately 4:24PM I was dispatched to a call for service at 1701 Wright St (Madison College Truax), City of Madison, County of Dane, WI, regarding a threats complaint. Dispatch advised that Madison College security was contacting police to report a threatening email they had received in which the sender threatens to shoot up the school and lists demands.

Contact with Madison College

Upon arriving on scene, I made contact with Madison College security staff, one of whom identified himself to me verbally as Luke F Adler (later confirmed via WI DOT photo). Adler explained to me that he is a supervisor of the security team at Madison College. Upon making contact in the security office, Adler showed me an email which security staff had been made aware of earlier in the day.

Upon being presented with the email, I noted that the email was addressed to approximately 50 different email addresses. I further noted that the email addresses the threatening email was sent to were all associated with one of three domains, those being @wisconsin.edu, @edgewood.edu, and @Madisoncollege.edu. Additionally, I observed that the email address the threatening email had been sent from was [REDACTED] A PII CMBND . The email read as follow:

"First off, I got my gun. It's a Sig Sauer, 9mm handgun ... The shooting is tomorrow. I have access to the gun and ammo. I have zero help for my mental problems, and it's causing me to shoot up the fucking school. I want help, but my parents won't listen to me, so I can't get any help. My parents won't listen to me about help or a therapist. I actually asked my dad to take me to the doctor the other day, and he just gave me some pills and said to 'suck it up.' If you don't want me to shoot the school then my demands are a secure cryptocurrency payment and a helicopter flight to Cuba. I'm from [REDACTED] A PII CMBND , Milwaukee, Wisconsin. I may be reached for the payment at +1 [REDACTED] A PII CMBND ."

Upon reviewing the email, Adler informed me that the security team at MATC had conducted some research regarding the phone number and address listed in the email. Adler stated to me that upon conducting this research, he had uncovered that the phone number and address are associated with one [REDACTED] VICTIM INFORMATION . Adler additionally explained that upon researching [REDACTED] VICTIM , security staff had

uncovered that [REDACTED] VICTIM has been "swatted" several times in the past and [REDACTED] VICTIM has been serially harassed online in the past. Adler was able to show me a google search of [REDACTED] VICTIM which returned a New York Post article which featured [REDACTED] VICTIM and detailed the fact that [REDACTED] VICTIM has been swatted dozens of times in the past. Adler expressed to me that he and other security staff believed that the email had been sent using a disposable email account in order to mask the identity of the true sender. Adler indicated to me that he believes that the email which was received is not genuinely from [REDACTED] VICTIM and that this email seems to be an extension of the online harassment aimed towards [REDACTED] VICTIM in the past.

Adler explained to me that Madison College security had been made aware of the email at approximately 3:00PM on 03/19/24 by one of the individuals who had received the email. Adler additionally stated that he believed that UWPD had already been contacted regarding this email and that UWPD had reached out to security staff at Edgewood College. When asked, Adler explained that he has no idea who may have sent the email. Adler explained that staff at Madison College had collected the IP address associated with the email but that the location for this IP address was in Kuala Lumpur.

Prior to departing, I had Madison College security staff forward me the relevant documentation surrounding the email as well as the exact email itself. I have attached these items to my report.

Contact with [REDACTED] VICTIM INFORMATION

After speaking with Madison college security, I then contacted [REDACTED] VICTIM via phone. Upon answering, [REDACTED] VICTIM explained that he was currently at his home in Milwaukee. I then explained to [REDACTED] VICTIM the nature of my investigation. When asked, [REDACTED] VICTIM stated that he had not sent the threatening email which I described. Moreover, [REDACTED] VICTIM denied having plans to commit acts of violence. [REDACTED] VICTIM stated to me that over the course of the past 5 years, a group of anonymous individuals have been engaged in "gang stalking" him and that this group of individuals have on several occasions made false reports to police in order to falsely implicate [REDACTED] VICTIM.

[REDACTED] VICTIM explained that just prior to my call, he had been contacted by a Waukesha detective due to the fact that Waukesha had received a similar email to the one which I had described. [REDACTED] VICTIM emphasized to me that he did not send the email, did not plan on committing acts of violence, and that this occurrence was another in a long line of harassing behaviors committed against him by online individuals. When asked, [REDACTED] VICTIM was unable to provide any specific identities of those engaged in gang stalking him and [REDACTED] VICTIM explained that he was unfamiliar with the email address which had sent the threatening email. [REDACTED] VICTIM explained that he had already previously contacted the Milwaukee police department and informed them as to the online harassment which he has been on the receiving end of, specifically in relation to "swatting."

Consultation with UWPD

After speaking with [REDACTED] VICTIM, I then requested a phone call from a UWPD officer via data. Upon being placed in touch with an officer, I discussed the nature of my investigation with the officer who identified himself to me verbally as PO Pharo. PO Pharo advised that UWPD was already aware of the email and had reached out to Edgewood college as well as UW Madison. PO Pharo additionally advised that

UWPD had concluded that the threats described in the email were unlikely to be followed through on.
